BEVERLY HEIGHTS PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH Welcome into the house of our God on this Ash Wednesday evening.

Tonight we inaugurate our celebration of the season of Lent. By the fourth century the church had determined that a period of fasting and repentance that corresponded with Jesus' forty days of temptation in the wilderness was an appropriate way to prepare for the celebration of the passion and death of our Savior. By counting backwards from Easter (excluding Sundays which were "feast days"), Wednesday became the start of the seven-week period we continue to observe today. The Lenten season is characterized by personal reflection upon one's own sin, repentance (the "giving up" of all that which contributes to sin and separation from God) and a celebration of all that Christ has accomplished for us through His suffering and death, all within the context of rich yet subdued music and worship.
