

We Direct Our Attention to the Cross

Our Old Testament lesson provides an incisive paradigm for our Lenten meditation this morning. Jeremiah was told by God to prophesy to the Israelites of Judah and the city of Jerusalem with sharp and penetrating words.

The people had turned away from the worship and service of the one, living and true God. Through the mouth of the prophet Jeremiah, the Lord said, "They have turned to me their back and not their face; and though I have taught them persistently they have not listened to receive instruction. They set up their abominations in the house which I call by My name, to defile it. They built the high places of Baal in the valley of the son of Hinnom, to offer up their sons and daughters to Molech, though I did not command them, nor did it enter into My mind that they should do this abomination, to cause Judah to sin."

The people will pay the consequences for disloyalty to God Who had done so much for them. Jerusalem will be destroyed, the Temple leveled, the gates to the city burned, and the people would be relocated to Babylon for 70 years of captivity.

Throughout the pages of the book which bears his name and in the text we read a moment ago, Jeremiah identifies three realities that the people of his day must understand. It bears our consideration as well while standing in the shadow of the cross today.

First, there is the reality of sin. In Judah's case it was the abomination of worshiping Baal and Molech, desecrating God's Temple with false worship, offering their children for sacrifices, and the degenerate behavior that accompanies a godless life. We, too, face the reality of our own sin which manifests itself in different ways yet, at its core, is a like rejection of God as Lord of our lives.

Second, there is the surety of punishment. Another prophet of God, Habakkuk, declares that God's eyes are "too pure to behold evil" so He looks on sinners with the fire of His just wrath. God punishes sin. Driving the Jews out of the land He had given them is a dramatic way of reminding us that sin of every stripe is punished by separation from God.

Finally, Jeremiah promises that deliverance is possible. God, Who hates sin but loves the sinner, will go to great lengths to restore His people to fellowship. Said the prophet, "Thus says the Lord: 'In this place...there shall be heard again the voice of mirth and the voice of gladness." It was the promise of God that He would visit them after 70 years and rebuild the city, the Temple and the nation.

The cross that stands before us wraps all three themes into a singular focus for us today. The cross reminds us that our sin is real. The cross reminds us that sin must be punished. The cross reminds us that God will go to great length, even the death of His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, to welcome us back into fellowship with Himself.

So, together, let us stand before the cross, let us confess our sins to God, and, as we consider all that Christ has done for us thereupon, let us, from our hearts, sing the Lord's song: "Give thanks to the Lord of hosts, for the Lord is good, for His steadfast love endures forever!"
